




It's August. I'm at my desk, preparing the funeral of a gentleman from Delves Lane who had twin passions in life; his garden, and golf. Laurie grew vegetables for the table, relishing the feeling of earth under his hands and revelled in the magnificent landscapes and the camaraderie of the golf course. The world around us is a pervasive theme for Laurie's eulogy.

I'm particularly musing over the reading from scripture that we've chosen for Laurie. It's the culmination of the first creation account in Genesis, the chapter punctuated with the refrain; 'God saw that it was good;'

'Then God said, "Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

As I look out of the study window, the leaves are already falling on the birch tree in our carriage circle. We've just had a few consecutive days of hot weather, and the trees are stressed. Apparently, extreme temperatures and a lack of water can cause trees to drop their leaves earlier than we'd expect. There are hosepipe bans in huge areas of the country after the driest eight-month period from November 2021 to June 2022 since 1976, when the country struggled with severe drought. Over that period, just 421mm (16.6in) of rain has fallen across England - less than three-quarters (74%) of the 1991-2020 average of 568mm (22.4in).

Farmers are struggling for water; some crops have already failed. And as the land lies dry and parched, raw sewage is being discharged into our rivers and into the sea, contaminating the marine environment and resulting in beach closures at the busiest time of the year. God gives us creation and appoints us his stewards; what have we done?

Creationtide begins on 1st September. Originally an Eastern Orthodox initiative, it has now spread widely among Anglican, Roman Catholic and Protestant congregations, bringing Christians together to pray and work for the protection of the environment that sustains everyone. As followers of Christ from around the globe we share a common call to care for creation, to give an accounting of our stewardship, and to recommit ourselves to our vocation to sustain and renew the face of the earth. It's fitting, given the signs of climate emergency all around us, that this year the theme of Creationtide is 'Listen to the Voice of Creation,' and the logo is the Burning Bush.

This year, both our parishes are entering fully into Creationtide. All our services will reflect the urgency to tackle climate change and to preserve our beautiful planet for coming generations. During this season we'll have some special events- take a look at the 'Dates for you Diary' page- culminating in the return of Messy Church at All Saints featuring the Crazy Creatures Petting Zoo, Harvest celebrations in all our churches, and a Blessing of the Animals at Lanchester.

In Creationtide we hope that our common prayer and action will help us listen for the voices of those who are silenced. In prayer we will lament the individuals, communities, species, and ecosystems in danger of being lost, and those whose livelihoods are threatened by habitat loss and climate change. In prayer we will centre the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor. We will remember those, like Laurie, who knew the consolation and the value of growing things and making the most of the landscape. We will remind ourselves that we are made in the image of God and that we have a huge responsibility to steward God's creation in ways that do not despoil

and destroy. And perhaps the refrain to our prayers should simply be;

'God saw that it was good...'


The Burning Bush

"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:18-20, ESV).

On Saturday 2nd of July I was ordained priest by Bishop Paul Butler in Durham Cathedral. This was a momentous occasion for me, my family and you my church family on this journey God has called us to. I began the week at Auckland Castle swearing the oath of allegiance to the Queen as head of the Church of England and canonical obedience to Bishop Paul and his successors in front of the diocesan registrar. Following the oaths and Bishop's charge we met at the bishop's house for lunch before heading off on retreat at Minsteracres.





On Sunday the 3rd I celebrated my first Eucharist at 10:30am at All Saints, Lanchester joined by St John's, Burnhope and then at St Thomas Church, Harelaw & Annfield Plain at 3pm. God has called me to these churches of different traditions and the liturgy I hope reflected these traditions within the breadth of the Church of England.

At All Saints the Revd. Penny Martin preached and many retired priests concelebrated the Eucharist with retired clergy who have nurtured me through my diaconal year followed by a buffet and ordination cake provided by the people of All Saints & St John's (wow). At St Thomas, Revd. Tom Sample preached, and we celebrated the Eucharist for the patronal festival of St Thomas followed by a buffet tea (another wow). I was priested because I felt called and affirmed by God that this is what He wanted for me and I answered that call placing my trust in His hands, knowing all would be well. I must thank for being a constant presence and support my mother benefice of St Mary the Virgin, Sherburn, St Cuthbert's, Shadforth & St Laurence Church, Pittington and my sending benefice which included St Laurence and St Mary Magdalen, Belmont a part of both my mother benefice parishes. Which leaves Lanchester, Burnhope, Harelaw and Annfield Plain. Well, sometimes curacies fail, sometimes they are not right but geez this is not my experience! From my first day as Deacon to the present day I have never felt the stranger or the new boy in the church community or the village community. Each experience and encounter with you has played a part in my formation as deacon and I know each of you will play a part in my journey as priest leading me in a few years' time to serving in my own parish,

For now, thank you for all you have done, thank you for your prayers and for making us feel welcome. Thank you to both the church community and the village community for your welcome and I look forward to working with you all doing God's work in this amazing place we are called to serve.

Happy Birthday to Hadrian's Wall

It was 1900 years ago, from 13th September 122 to 128, that Hadrian's Wall was built in northern England. It ran for nearly 80 miles from coast to coast and marked the northern limit of the Roman Empire. The Roman Emperor, Hadrian, wanted to separate the Romans from 'the barbarians'.

In pre-Christian England the Picts – from Scotland, or Caledonia – were a real threat, often raiding Roman territories, using what we would call guerilla warfare to steal cattle and capture slaves in a province far from the centre of the empire. But the Wall also served to encourage trading with those outside, and enable the Romans to tax anyone who entered their territory.

Hadrian had a mixed reputation as Emperor. Described by historian Edward Gibbon as one of the "five good emperors", he was regarded by many as a benevolent dictator but by others as remote (he did spend a great deal of time away from Rome) and authoritarian, sometimes generous and sometimes cruel. He was certainly ambitious.

He was responsible for putting down the Bar Kokhba revolt in Judea (132-136) in an almost genocidal way. More than half a million Jews perished, and many more died of starvation or disease. This is a critical event in the history of the Jewish people.

Today the Wall remains the largest surviving archaeological feature from Roman Britain, and an amazing feat of engineering through difficult country – though only 10 per cent of it remains still visible. It is sometimes mistakenly thought to mark the English-Scottish border, but in fact most of Northumberland – an English county – is north of the wall.

The Language of Flowers

SPLENDOUR or PATRIOTISM

Nasturtium (scarlet) - Tropaeolum

Nasturtiums were first brought from Peru late in the sixteenth century. The name can be literally translated from the Latin as 'nose-twister' or 'nose



tormentor', referring to the plant's biting, pungent taste, reminiscent of watercress.

Linnaeus devised the nasturtium's generic name, Tropaeolum, from the Latin tropaeum, a trophy, because the helmet-shaped flowers and shield-like leaves conjured notions of the aftermath of battle when Greeks and Romans would set up a tall trophy pole (the tropaeum) and drape the armour of the vanquished foe on it as an emblem of victory.

The flame flower with its brilliant scarlet blooms is one of the most beautiful of the species. Nasturtiums are also known as Indian cress and lark's heel because 'unto the backe-part (of the flowers) doth hang a taile or spurre such as hath the Larkes heel' (Gerard).



The flowers can be eaten in salads and the seeds can be substituted for capers. I would just rather look at the nasturtium flowers in the garden.

Saints: 9th September St. Peter Claver Compassion for Slaves

Here is a saint for anyone with a social conscience. Claver was born in 1581 near Barcelona at Verdu, and at 20 became a Jesuit. He went as a missionary to New Granada and worked to alleviate the terrible suffering of the slaves who arrived from West Africa, caged like animals. (It was said that you could smell the stench of a slave ship while it was still seven miles from shore.) Claver helped the poor wretches who survived long enough to reach dry land. He gave them food and medicine as well as spiritual comfort. He is said to have cared for and baptised 300,000 slaves. What a difference one life can make to thousands of people!

Pauline's Reflection

I write this as I prepare to go on retreat, and I feel desperately in need of it. I think many of us experience a spiritual "burn-out" at some time in our lives. That awful time when you feel that you are praying into a void; when you are reaching deep into the well of your soul and bringing up only dust and stones because you are scraping the bottom. That well of sweet living water, that you have drunk from so very deeply in the past, is dry.

It is awful

It is terrifying. Where is God?

Malcolm and I used to go away 3-4 times a year in our little caravan and on occasion I would go away on my own (well, with a small dog), but of course lockdown stopped that. There has been no opportunity for spiritual or physical refreshment. I've felt myself struggling - not only to write sermons, prayers and reflections, but worse than that - to feel anything at all

I cannot feel God. I began to doubt the existence of God. I have had to remind myself that I HAVE experienced God; that I KNOW God is there, and that it is I who am lacking, not the Creator. I remind myself, too, that I have experienced this darkness and emptiness before, and that when the darkness lifts I find that I have experienced a profound change which has taken place in that spiritual desert. And when you think about it, that sounds right, doesn't it? Every prophet in the Old Testament goes into the desert - the silence, the emptiness, the withdrawal from interaction with others allows them to meet God, hear God, and learn what God really wants them to do. Jesus himself went into the wilderness for 40 days. That "emptiness" is not empty at all. It is full of God.

I know, in my heart, that these empty times are not a spiritual death, but rather a metamorphosis; like a caterpillar which pupates to become completely remade and emerge as a butterfly, the soul reaches a stage where it needs to withdraw to allow God to work within it in the deep, enfolding, protective darkness so that necessary changes can take place. God brings us back on track.

I hope that sooner rather than later I will emerge, blinking at the light, having experienced a profound yet indefinable shift. That is what has happened in the past, and I pray that that is what will happen this time. I hope that the retreat, with its opportunity for immersing myself in prayer, with no distractions, will be the catalyst for it.

I pray that at worst I will return rested and refreshed - but that at best God will finish whatever change is taking place. I remind myself that God's time is not our time. **But God's time is the right time.**

Christian Basics: Why Belong to the Church? by Canon Paul Hardingham

Many people are struggling to connect with church today following the pandemic. However, we should 'not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing' (Hebrews 10:25). The church is not simply a building or services, but a shared friendship with Jesus, as the NT makes clear.

1. The Family of God

The church is a community united by their love for God and readiness to share this love with others: 'a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light' 1Peter 2:9. It is in the life of the church that people can connect with God's love.

2. The Body of Christ

The church is also Christ's body on earth, 'The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ'. 1 Cor 12:12 We all have a unique contribution to make, using our different gifts, experience and passion. However, beware of those attitudes that stop us representing Christ: inferiority 'I have nothing to offer' or superiority 'I don't need you'

3. A Holy Temple

In the OT the temple was God's home on earth; now the church has become His home: 'In Him the whole building is joined together ... in Him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by His Spirit.' Ephesians 1: 21,22. Church is a place where people can be loved, accepted and welcomed home. Is this our experience of church and what changes would make it more as God intends?

Don't forget: 'The local church is the hope of the world' (Bill Hybels).



From the Archives

An Extract from the Parish Magazine of September 1895

My dear Friends,

With a fine St, Swithun's day everyone was expecting and hoping for favourable weather, but unfortunately it has been a most hindersome time for the hay, so much so that we are able to see the harvest begun, with fields in stook, and a great deal of hay not stacked yet; whilst speaking of harvest may I ask our good friends, who grow any corn, to reserve a little of each kind for the decoration of the church at the "Harvest Home" on Wednesday, October 2nd. The Tea will be held in the School, commencing at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The prices of admission being the same as previously, 2/6 and 9d. The Thanksgiving Service in the Church will begin at 7 o'clock, when the Preacher will be the Rev. W. Cosgrave, Vicar of West Hartlepool; with the hearty co-operation of our people I hope that our undertaking may prove a great success.

But before the "Harvest Home" is held we have to think about the Sale of Work, which is to be opened by Canon Body, at 2 o'clock on Wednesday, Sept. 4th, in the Schools.

Besides the plain sewing and useful garments, there are to be offered for sale many fancy things in the shape of work, soaps, scents, ornaments &c. Then we hope to have a Stall of farm produce, consisting of butter, eggs, fowls, and the like; at intervals during the Sale there will be selections of music; and Refreshments in the Infants' Room at a moderate price.

The next event we have to chronicle is the Annual Choir Excursion, this year to Whitby; leaving home at 7.30 a.m. on Monday 19th, we joined an excursion train at Durham. And after a long, though by no means tedious, journey we reached our destination, passing through that lovely scenery in Cleveland. After partaking of dinner the ascent of the 199 steps to the old Church and Monastic ruin was made; it being Regatta day there was a great deal to be seen going on in the harbour; an hour spent on the briny ocean, and a refreshing cup of tea, as best we could get it, brought our sojourn at the quaint picturesque town to a close, and the return journey enlivened by many a song and chorus was accomplished just before midnight; the weather having been splendid, a most enjoyable day was spent. It was well for us to visit the home of that saintly woman, Hilda, the chief instigator of the Northumbrian Church in its earliest stage, and closely connected with our own county; the Tyne, the Wear, the Hartlepools, these are our chief centres of population and commerce, and with all these her name is connected; in our own Parish Register I find the original name of Shields, St. Hilda in the last century.

From the Wardens

We are currently awaiting the contractor to carry out the boiler servicing. We have contacted MSD who have carried out work for us before. They have agreed to make arrangements to come to see the boiler. There may be a problem with the fluing arrangement in the boiler house. The existing arrangement does not meet with current standards. This was fine when British Gas was the servicing provider but a new servicing contractor may take a view that the fluing arrangement may need alteration. MSD have commented on this before but we need to revisit the problem. This may be a costly exercise if required and will require a faculty.

The ornamental light fitting above the Chapter House Door (externally) was found to have been pulled from the wall. We assume that this had been done deliberately and we temporarily removed it as it is extremely heavy and could have been a potential danger to users of the Churchyard path. Arrangements to refix it have been made.

The Church piano has been tuned. Our thanks to David Baggott for arranging this.

Thank you to Pauline and Richard Hall for the loan of a leaf blower which will be extremely useful around the churches especially as Autumn approaches.

At St John's we are still in contact with the Probation Service who we are hoping will take over work on the Churchyard, relieving Kenny Barron of the burden of looking after the mowing etc. We extend our grateful thanks to Kenny for the unstinting work he has carried out in past years. The headstone which was (illegally) moved by the family has still not been returned. Fortunately, it is behind the church as it is quite unsightly.

A working group will be formed to ensure a Churchyard tidy this year for both Churches. We still await a quotation for ridge repairs and are actively looking for another contractor to prepare this.


